Children between the age of 14-16 may work but there are restrictions on where they can work and the hours they can work. This factsheet explains what the law says. And because you are a minor, you will need to get permission from your parents to work here.



ACTSHEET

Children between the ages of 14 and 16 may not do work that:

- is dangerous
- will stop them from attending school or doing their homework
- is unhealthy
- will affect their physical, mental, spiritual, moral or social development.

Children between the ages of 14 and 16 may not work in the evening from 20h00 until 07h00.

Children between the ages of 14 and 16 may not work:


- on a construction or demolition site
- in a place where work is done underground or in a mine
- in a place where goods are manufactured
- at a power plant
- where machinery is put together or taken apart.

The government can change the list of places where a child between the ages of 14 and 16 may or may not work.






















The Namibian Constitution says that no one, child or adult, may work as a slave or be forced to work. The Namibian Constitution also states that children must be protected from exploitation. Children under the age of 14 may not be employed and children between the ages of 14 and 16 may not do work that is dangerous, will stop them from attending school or doing their homework, is unhealthy, or will affect their physical, mental, spiritual, moral or social development. The Labour Act of 2007 follows the provisions in the Constitution and gives more detail. For example, the Labour Act says that children between the ages of 14 and 16 may not work in the evening after 20h00 or before 07h00 in the morning.

CHILD WORK AND WORKING HOURS

- Children below the age of 14 may not be employed.
- Children below the age of 14-16 may be employed, but they may not work between the hours of 20h00 and 07h00.
- The standard working hours apply to people aged 18 and above (you may work 45 hours per week, you may work 10 hours overtime per week).

PLACE OF WORK

Children between the ages of 14 and 16 may not work:

- on a construction or demolition site
- in a place where work is done underground or in a mine
- in a place where goods are manufactured
- at a power plant
- where machinery is put together or taken apart.
